Bite The Bullet



Meaning: To endure a painful or otherwise unpleasant situation that is seen as unavoidable.

Origin: The phrase was first recorded by Rudyard Kipling in his 1891 novel *The Light that Failed*. It was suggested by the movie “Bite the Bullet” that biting the bullet meant

using a shell casing to cover an aching tooth, especially one that had been broken, and where a nerve is exposed. In the film, the slug was removed from the bullet, the cap was hit to expend that charge, and the casing was cut down to allow it to sit level with the other teeth.

Break A Leg



Meaning: It's an idiom in theatre used to wish a performer “good luck” in an ironic way.

Origin: Urbane Irish nationalist Robert Wilson Lynd published an article, “A Defence of Superstition”, in the 1 October 1921 edition of the *New Statesman*, a British liberal political and cultural magazine. Lynd regarded the theatre as the second-most

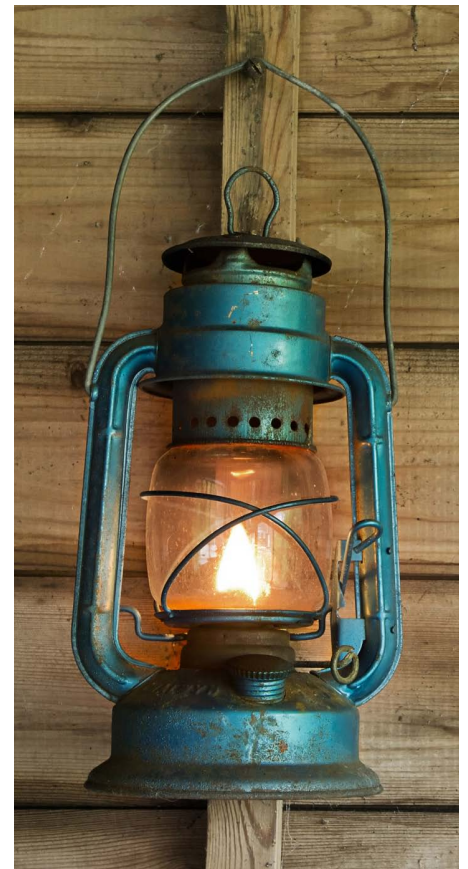
superstitious institution in England, after horse racing. In horse racing, Lynd asserted, to wish a man luck is considered unlucky, so “You should say something insulting such as, ‘May you break your leg!’” Lynd did not attribute the phrase in any way to theatre people, though he was familiar with many of them and frequently mingled with actors backstage.

Burning The Midnight Oil

Meaning: To work late into the night. Originally this was by the light of an oil lamp or candle. More recently, the phrase is used figuratively, alluding back its use before electric lighting.

Origin: The English author Francis Quarles wrote in *Emblemes*, 1635: Wee spend our mid-day sweat, or mid-night oyle; Wee tyre the night in thought; the day in toyle.

At that time there was a verb for working late by candlelight - elucubrate. Henry Cockeram defined that in his *The English dictionary, or an interpreter of hard English words*, 1623: “Elucubrate, to doe a thin



by candlelight.” Clearly, we no longer have much call for that word and it has fallen out of use. Although it is probably some years since anyone needed to do it in reality the phrase ‘burning the midnight oil’ is still in everyday use. Porter Wagoner and Dolly Parton released an album called *The Right Combination/Burning the Midnight Oil*, in 1972.

Time To Do This...

- ✓ Dig out and remove rotted or damaged fence posts, mailbox posts, overgrown shrubs or damaged shrubs.
- ✓ Remove winter-worn branches from trees and shrubs.
- ✓ Make your first application of spring fertilizer. Spread seed in southern climates.
- ✓ Schedule small engine tuneups or perform tuneups after buying spark plugs, air filter elements, crankcase oil, two-stroke oil, gas stabilizer, fresh gasoline, lawnmower blade, string trimmer blades or line.
- ✓ Sharpen your shears, hoe and shovel, then pump up that wheelbarrow tire.
- ✓ As soon as the weather permits, by all means open your windows and start painting inside.
- ✓ Tidy up behind and under the dryer, then clean the dryer vent.
- ✓ Make room to store winter equipment and clothing by taking advantage of wasted spaces in attics, crawlspaces, closets and garage.
- ✓ Clean your coffeemaker with vinegar or scale-removal product sold at hardware stores.
