Spring Cleaning Tips – Truth and Consequences

"Spring" is not a dirty word except when it's used with "Spring Cleaning."

Spring means there is work to be done around the home. We have some tips to help you remove the dirt and stains in the Spring, starting with Upholstered Furniture and Draperies.

Upholstered Furniture

Since the fabric covering your upholstered furniture can't be removed, you must clean the fabric while on the furniture. Cushions can sometimes be removed from their covers and cleaned. However, re-inserting the cushions may result in an improper fit.

Upholstery fabrics are made from numerous varieties of fibers or fiber blends, and many include latex or similar coatings on the reverse side. Such coatings give the fabric extra body, stabilizes the weave, and prevents shallow seams from unraveling during use. Each of these factors can affect how effective your cleaning efforts will be.

Knowing how to clean a fabric-covered couch means knowing how to remove stains. You can use a commercial cleaner, or you can make your own cleaners from natural ingredients you have in the kitchen. A home remedy for removing fabric stains from upholstered furniture is to mix 1/4 cup vinegar, 3/4 warm water and 1 tablespoon of dish soap. Put in a spray bottle. Mist the soiled area. Scrub with a soft cloth until the stain lifts. Use a second cloth moistened with clean water to remove the soap. Dry with a towel.

When trying a new stain removal formula,

always test an inconspicuous area of the upholstery before using any of the methods to test for colorfastness. Also the above suggestions do not apply to leather and synthetic furniture.

Draperies

Draperies are often left hanging for years before they are cleaned. Since draperies serve as an air filter inside the home, over time soil and dust will accumulate in them. Outside atmospheric dirt and gasses can also soil the drapes. To help with this, replace your HVAC filters regularly.

One way to protect your draperies from airborne contaminants is to vacuum them using the upholstery attachment at least annually.

There are three main challenges when cleaning drapes:

Fabrics degradation – Determine if the drapes, including the lining, can withstand the cleaning process. Exposure to sunlight, moisture, and changing temperatures lead to fabric damage in the drapes. Careful inspection and slightly stressing the drapes can usually answer that question. Slightly pulling on two sides of the fabric and lining about six inches apart will give you a good idea about the fabric strength.

Water stains – These result from condensation on the window, humidity, or even spilled liquids causing the soils to disperse, leaving a stained area. Moisture can also displace drapery sizing. After the moisture evaporates, a ring or streak may be

noticeable because solvent-soluble soils will be removed.

Yellowing – Over time drapes will yellow throughout or sometimes only in certain areas. Most fibers have a natural tendency toward slow oxidation and yellowing both from aging and from atmospheric exposure. Fabric used to cover a window is exposed to both direct and indirect lighting causing discoloration. Some fabrics are treated with sizing or finishes to impart body. These treatments may cause the fabric to oxidize and yellow with age.

We can often get water stains out of drapes, but only if the drapes can withstand the process. Removing yellowing and discoloration are possible but requires skill and a little luck. Allow us to inspect your drapes to determine if stain removal is possible (even if you want to clean them yourself).

The TRUTH is, you can try to remove stains and discoloration in these household fabrics but be careful because there are CONSEQUENCES. At the same time, we can't remove all stains, but if anyone can, Champion Cleaners can.

CAN'T DO SOMTHING TO SAVE MY LIFE

Meaning: We use the expression "fat chance" to refer to something that is incredibly unlikely. Bizarrely, and contrary to what one might expect, the related expression "slim chance" means the same thing.

Example: "We might win the Lottery." "Fat chance."

Origins: The origins of this expression are unclear, but the use of the word "fat" is likely to be a sarcastic version of saying "slim chance". A similar expression is "Chance would be a fine thing", which refers to something that one would like to happen, but that is very unlikely.

TURN A BLIND EYE



Meaning: To "turn a blind eye" to something means to pretend not to have noticed it.

Example: "She took one of the cookies, but I turned a blind eye."

Origins: Interestingly, this expression is said to have arisen as a result of the famous English naval hero Admiral Horatio Nelson, who, during the Battle of Copenhagen in 1801, is alleged to have deliberately raised his telescope to his blind eye, thus ensuring that he would not see any signal from his superior giving him discretion to withdraw from the battle.

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


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St. Patrick's Day
